Most of coastal lagoons formed as a result of the Late Quaternary marine transgression, which begun approximately 18,000 years ago and finished about 3,000 years ago, leaving a mean sea level close to the present. The building of the coastal barriers was due to the interaction of river sediments (transported in large quantity in the period of the melting of snowfields) with the marine processes (winds, currents and waves).

shallow water bodies separated

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from the ocean by a barrier (e.g., narrow spit), connected at least intermittently to the ocean by one or more restricted inlets, and usually geographically oriented parallel to the shore-line. Coastal lagoons are flexible and usually able to cope with environmental change, yet nowadays they are under threat. This is partly due to climate change impacts (for example, sea-level rise and hydro-meteorological extreme events) but also due to more direct human activities and pressures. The book focuses on addressing these challenges through integrated management strategies seen in a land-sea and science-stakeholder-policy perspective. Pan-European management challenges are seen
