Labeling is an excellent way to start your writing curriculum. At the beginning of the year, students are learning that words have meaning. Letters and words can be used to represent plants, animals, objects, places and people in the world around them and on paper. I often start with using little note cards to label all of the objects in our classroom.

### **Writing at the Beginning of the Year in Kindergarten ...**

At the beginning of the year, we may just focus on the beginning sound. I'll have a student identify and write the first letter, then i'll write the rest of the word. Once we get going, though, I have students identify and write the beginning and ending sound or the beginning, medial,

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and ending sounds and that's all we put up there.

Keeping in mind I teach kindergarten, my students use blank paper for their writing. There is usually a line or fold to distinguish where the writing and drawing will take place. For the drawing they use colored pencils. I find students have a fair amount of control over them and there is no ink to bleed through the paper.

In my framework, I have long required teachers to devote 20-25% of the language arts time to writing, and that is true for kindergarten classes, too. Since I think the total time allocation for language arts should be 2-3 hours, that means 24-45 minutes of writing time per day in a kindergarten class.
